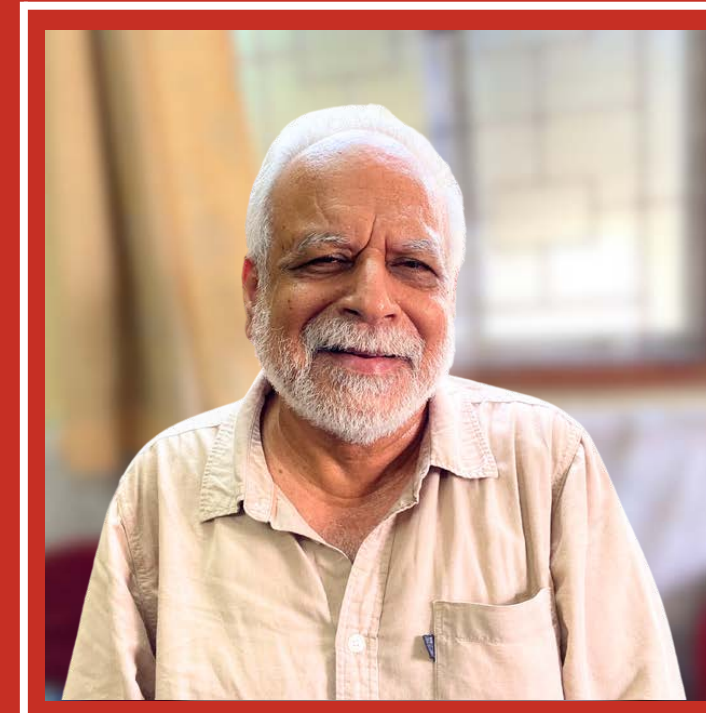
LETTER FROM SECRETARY

In late 2022-23 (financial year), thanks to the GROW fund, our Calcutta Rescue team, including SG members and volunteers, had an inspiring offsite brainstorming session.

We're laying the foundation for a new Health Strategy to reach more beneficiaries due to urbanization trends. The state's shift towards urban clinics will reduce our disease management burden. Cervical Cancer pilot project is a success. We aim to scale up to 400 cases in 2023-24. Our digitalization journey, with the Beneficiary Management System is helping doctors focus on patient care.

"Living Standards" initiative is building 60 permanent homes in a Dakshineswar slum with support from our Swiss-German group "Stiftung CR."

The Vermicomposting Project in Dakshineswar, supported by CESC, turns organic waste into manure, providing livelihoods and waste disposal solutions. Our Educational Project achieved outstanding board exam results this year. "Life Skills," a new initiative with Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives, offers vocational training and essential skills to CR students. Progress on renovating our new educational centre "Pathshala" is steady.



Our flagship clinic, Talapark, has a fresh look post-renovation, and the State Health Department has renewed our Clinical Establishment License. In the Tangra slum area, our new clinic, funded by Direct Relief of USA, began serving around 7000 slum dwellers in November '22.

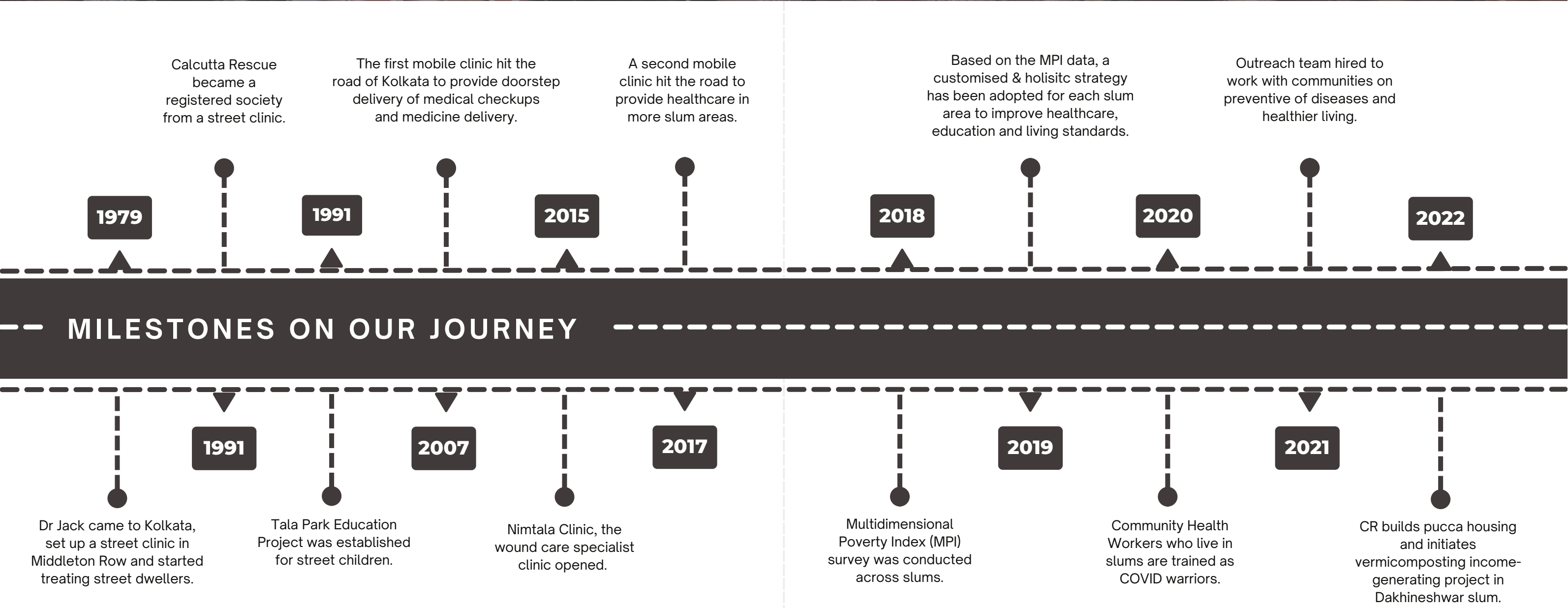
We're grateful for generous donations from our supporters. Our Fundraising Team excelled in generating funds and forming partnerships with organizations like GROW.

A huge thank you to all our dedicated volunteers who travelled shared insights and contributed to our progress.

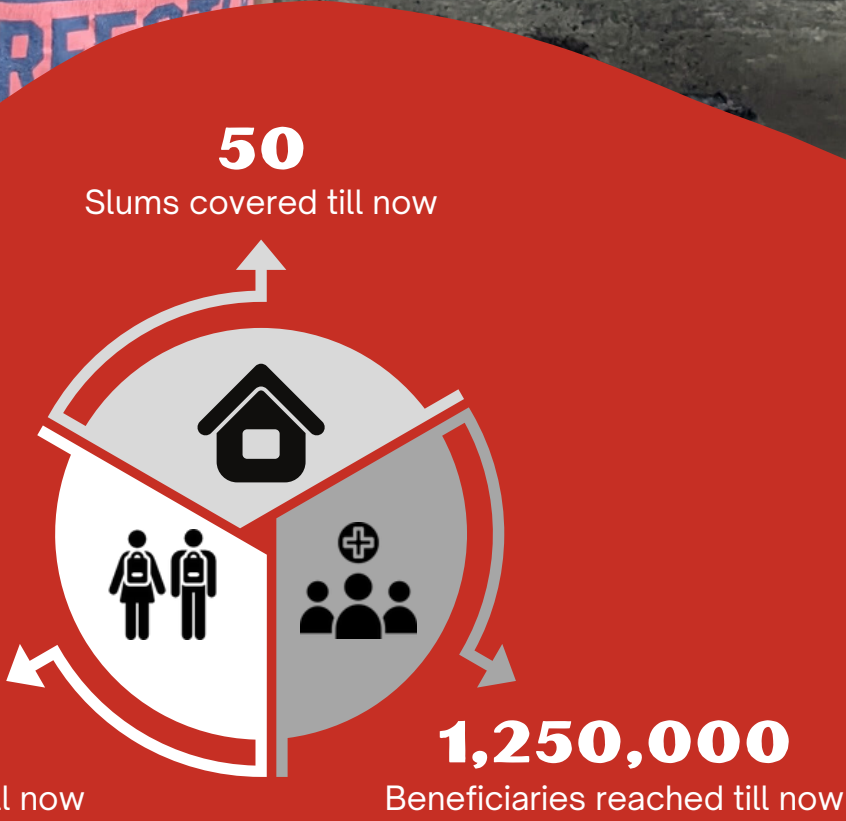
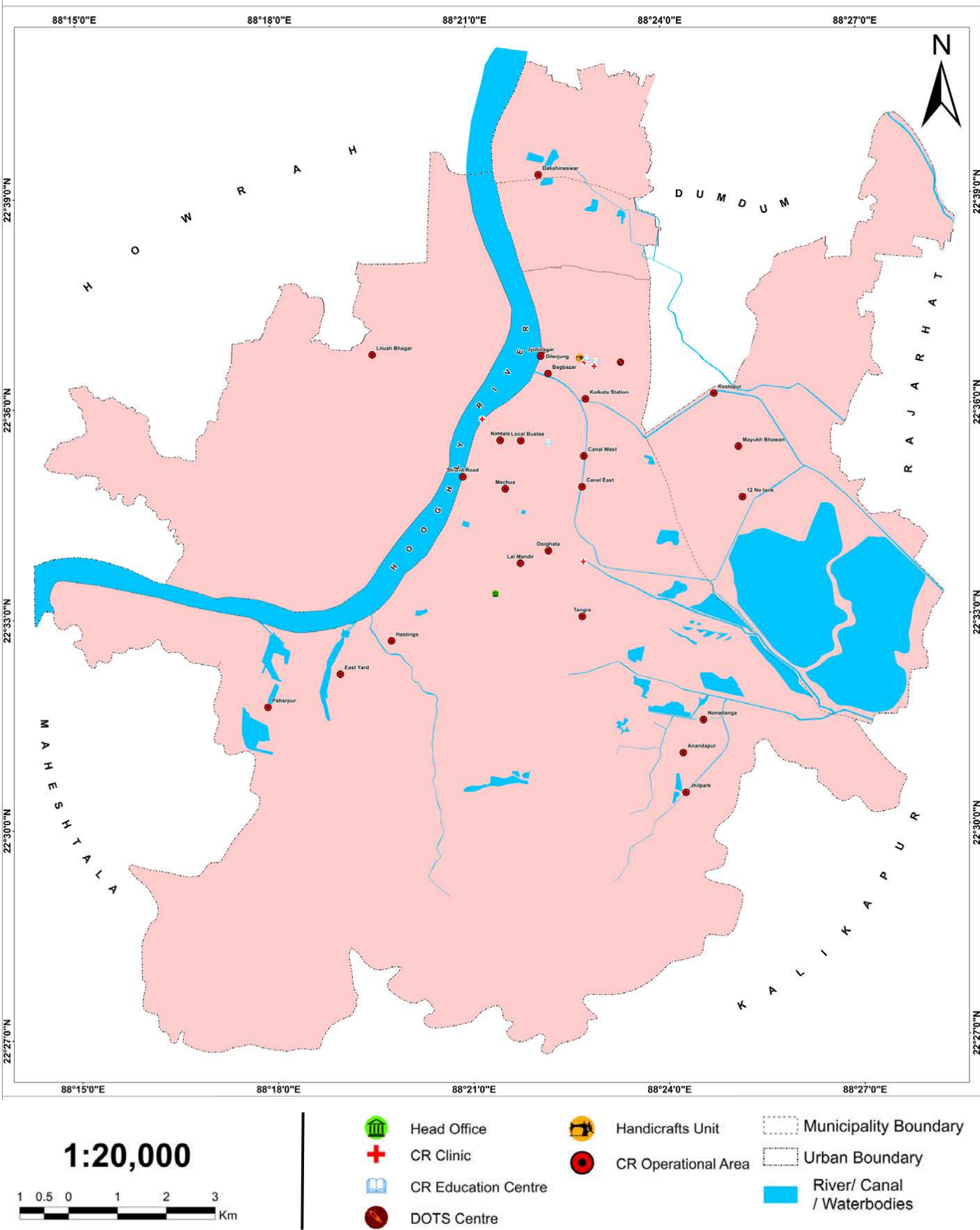

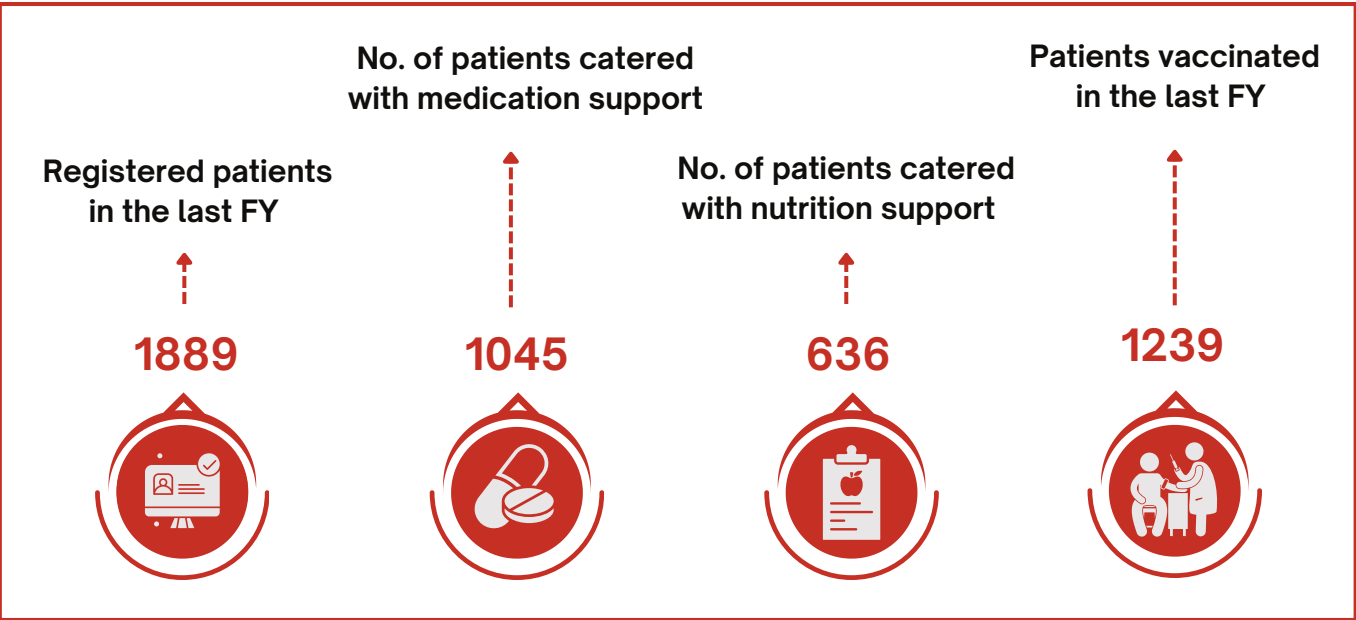

► Tala Park Clinic

The largest fixed clinic, based in the heart of Kolkata, provides free treatment to various types of patients, including those with cardiac, diabetic, renal, cancer, pneumology, neurology, endocrinology, rheumatology, thalassemia, speech and physiotherapy, HIV. It also offers mother and child care services, special education for its specially-abled children, mental counselling, nutrition and sanitary packs.

Over the last two years, this clinic has been placing a greater emphasis on prevention by introducing various vaccinations for all age groups, such as HPV, Influenza, and Pneumonia vaccines.



Cervical Cancer Screening

Cervical cancer is the second leading cause of cancer deaths among women in India, caused by Human Papillomavirus (HPV), but early identification and treatment can save lives.

The project is the brainchild of Dr Moona Rakhit who is a supporter from the UK where women are routinely screened for these diseases. The cancer screening project was initially piloted for female HIV patients. Staff were first trained. Then our women beneficiaries, aged 25 to 45, were educated about cervical cancer and then screened. The pilot was a great success. There is now a good demand among CR's women beneficiaries to get themselves screened.



Empowering Tumpa's Journey

At 26, Tumpa faced a lifetime of health challenges under Calcutta Rescue's care—diagnosed with leprosy (now cured) and a heart condition requiring ongoing monitoring. Despite her fragile health, she married and had a child.

In August 2021, amidst the pandemic, she discovered another pregnancy. Calcutta Rescue immediately enrolled her in the Mother & Child Health program, conducting vital tests that confirmed her baby's health. However, Tumpa's condition worsened, necessitating multiple hospitalizations arranged by CR staff.

In December 2021, Tumpa gave birth to a daughter prematurely, and her baby required intensive care. Calcutta Rescue provided unwavering support to both mother and child, leading to their thriving health. **Calcutta Rescue is continuing to support the child with nutrition and iron therapy and will assist until she is totally healthy and lifelong support will be provided to Tumpa for her heart condition.**



► Urban Dots

Calcutta Rescue's specialised TB clinic works closely with the government. If the government fails to supply the necessary medicines, the clinic ensures the provision of those drugs.

TB patients often develop additional health problems due to having weaker immune systems. The clinic offers extra support for TB patients with various conditions, including cardiac, diabetic, pneumology, neurology, endocrinology, rheumatology, and more. In addition to free medicines, the clinic provides house visits, health education, nutrition counselling, vital checks for patients, physiotherapy, counselling services, fundoscopy, adult vaccinations, and dressing changes. The clinic also offers various investigations such as blood tests, ultrasounds (USG), and electrocardiograms (ECG).



Mrinmoy's TB Battle: A Story of Resilience and Recovery



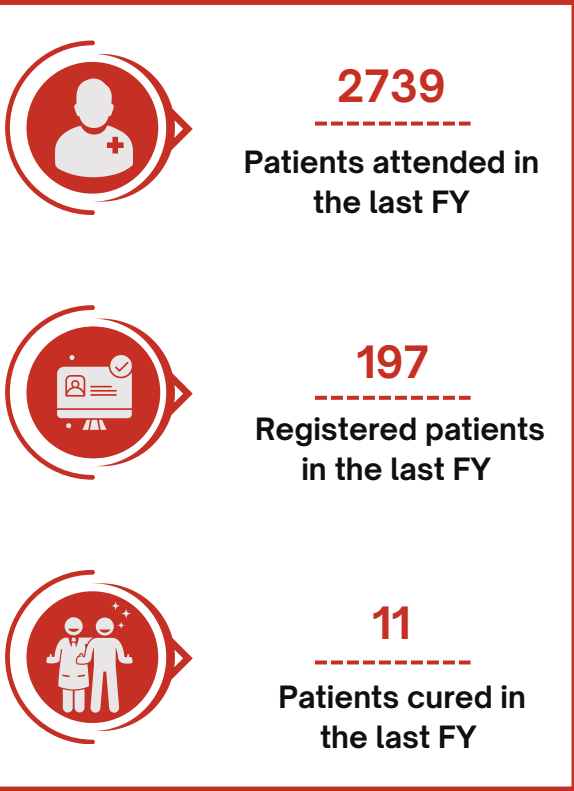

In 2015, he was diagnosed while working as a freelance press photographer. He lost his job. He couldn't afford medicine until he received help from Calcutta Rescue in 2015. He was cured the following year but relapsed in 2017 with drug-resistant TB. Dependent on him, his family struggled, and his wife started tutoring for income. Mrinmoy lost hope but restarted treatment at Calcutta Rescue with his family's support. He was finally completely cured by the end of 2022. Grateful for their continuous support, he now aims to work again and care for his family.



► Nimtala Clinic

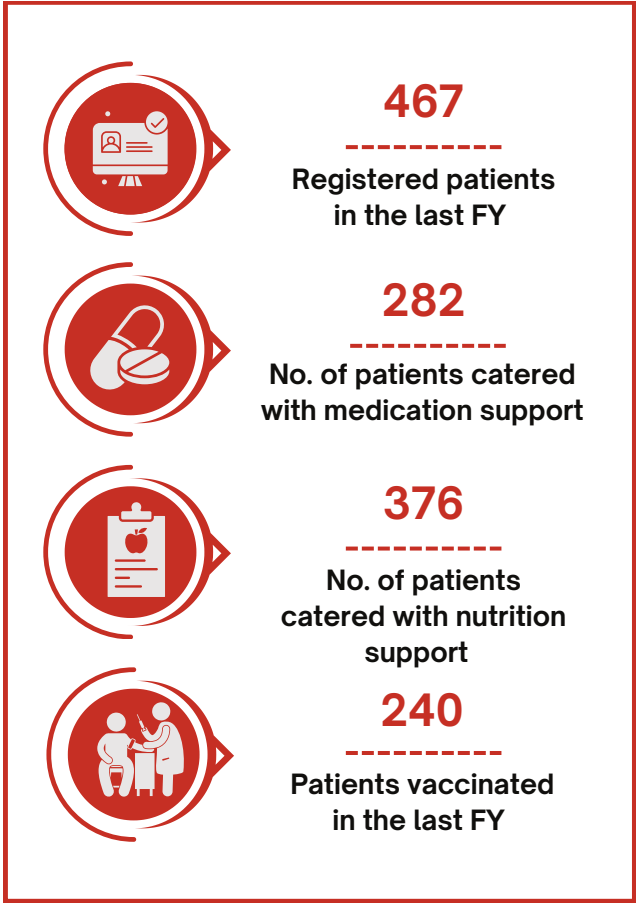
Calcutta Rescue's specialised wound care clinic. After the Chitpore clinic (CR's leprosy clinic) was closed the previous financial year, the patients were transferred to the Nimtala clinic. Nimtala Clinic receives the largest number of patients with wounds, which are often gruesome and critical. Most patients are street dwellers and homeless people. Alongside wound dressing, the clinic provides health education, nutrition, counselling, vital checkups, physiotherapy, fundoscopy, adult vaccinations, and hospitalization for severely ill patients in nursing homes and hospitals.



Ava's Second Chance: Battling Infection and Amputation

Ava, a 58-year-old widow, survived leprosy thanks to Calcutta Rescue three years ago but suffered severe foot damage. She also has diabetes and high blood pressure. Living 14 km from the clinic, she regularly visited for care but suddenly stopped for a month. A quick call from the clinic revealed that her recovering leprosy wounds had become infected and due to her high blood sugar, it turned fatal quickly, requiring immediate hospitalization. Nimtala clinic team immediately started the journey to admit her into a hospital. After she was finally hospitalized doctors amputated her leg to save her life. Now, CR cares for her wounds and plans to provide an artificial limb. Ava's son, Kiran, expressed immense gratitude to CR for their support during this challenging time.

► Dr. Gazi Mohibor Rahaman Memorial Free Clinic, Tangra



Started in November 2022, Tangra clinic is the newest clinic of Calcutta Rescue. Named after the memory of **Dr. Gazi Mohibor Rahaman (1958-2021)** lovingly called Dr. Bobby, former Chief Executive of Calcutta Rescue and Governing Council member, this clinic caters to the huge number of patients of the Tangra slum area.

For around a decade, CR's mobile clinic had been visiting Tangra slums. The demand for our services has increased exponentially in recent years, which the mobile clinic was unable to adequately meet. Therefore CR decided to approach donors to fund a new fixed clinic in this vicinity. And was fortunate enough to get funding from an exceptional partner in Direct Relief International USA.

Alauddin's Journey from Neglect to Care

Calcutta Rescue's Community Health Worker found 81-year-old Alauddin sleeping outdoors in Tangra slum area. Neglected by his children, he was suffering from high blood sugar and chronic pneumonia. He was brought to the clinic for treatment, which included medication, inhalers, and nutritional support.

Alauddin, who previously lived in a slum under a flimsy plastic sheet, has seen improvement in his health due to months of care from Calcutta Rescue. With the help of his daughter and the Community Health Worker, he received food and expressed gratitude towards the organization.



► Street Medicine

Calcutta Rescue’s street medicine program involves dedicated healthcare professionals providing essential medical services, including basic check-ups, vaccinations, and health education, to marginalized populations living on the streets or in slums. It monitors those already with disease-preventing further deterioration in health, as well as expectant and new mothers, and their newborns. This grassroots approach aims to address the unique health challenges faced by these communities and improve their overall well-being.

Street Medicine programme has appointed some Community Health Workers (CHWs) slum basis who play a crucial role in delivering accurate medical services and raising awareness in a language that the community understands.

Surviving Tragedy: Mehrin's Healing Path

Mehrin, a 20-year-old, had a life-altering encounter when her estranged husband attacked her with a can of flammable liquid while she was collecting water with her young son. Both Mehrin and her husband were set on fire, and she suffered severe burns. She was quickly rushed to the hospital, but her husband didn't survive.

Living in the Hastings slum, Mehrin received crucial support from Calcutta Rescue's street medicine teams. They dressed her wounds, provided medication, nutrition, and counseling for her and her traumatized three-year-old son. Project Arpan also supplied food packets to the family. A community health worker monitored her progress daily.

Mehrin is steadily improving, but she requires ongoing follow-up and dressing for several more months until her full recovery. Calcutta Rescue's support was crucial during this challenging time, helping both Mehrin and her son regain their emotional well-being.



► Outreach

Started in the latter part of 2021, Calcutta Rescue's awareness and prevention of diseases approach is called Outreach. Two teams are deployed in 10 slum areas. Each team consists of 3 members who provide the slum dwellers with awareness sessions through interactive discussions.

They also communicate directly with the designated Community Health Workers (CHWs) of the slum area and train them as well to serve their slum areas.

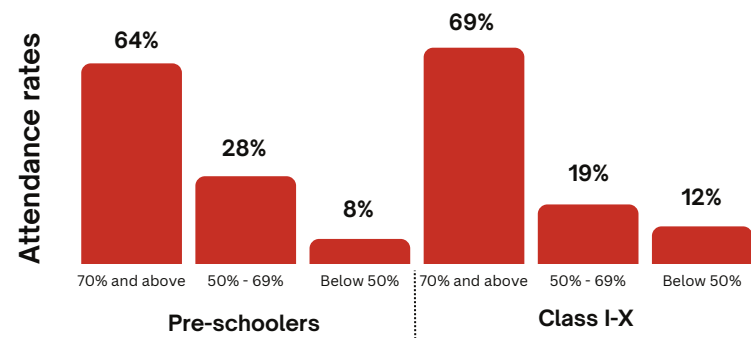
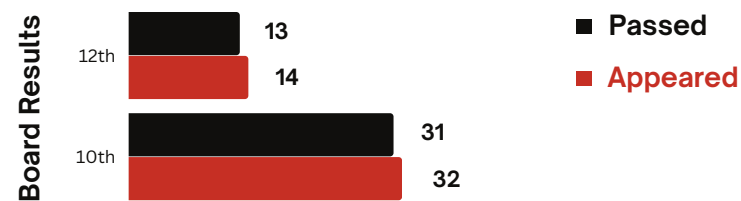
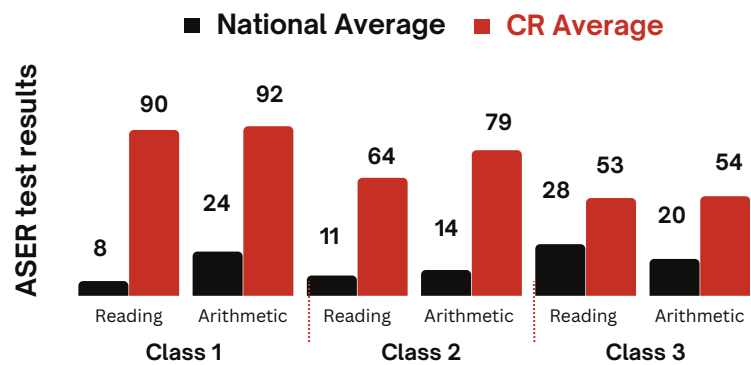

Annual Status of Educational Report Tests, also called ASER test is a national-level educational aptitude survey that measures the level of maths, English and vernacular languages of students. The survey is carried out every year by the education NGO, Pratham. Calcutta Rescue also conducts these tests for its students to benchmark their level against the national average. CR students do much better than the national average.



Average attendance in school: CR students are generally regular in school, so they are less vulnerable to the risk of being dropouts, except in special cases when the family relocates to some other place.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Calcutta Rescue works actively on providing vocational training to students from class 8 onwards. We guide students towards a career of their aspiration and skill set – irrespective of it being an academic career or sports or fine arts. CR also provides the training costs of these vocational courses and supports them till the students are financially independent.

Manisha Kumari Singh scored 84.40% in the Class 12 board examination. She came to Calcutta Rescue at a young age, and her family was left heartbroken and scared after her father's passing, as he was the sole earning member. But without giving up she strived for her future.

Dilip's Artistic Fulfillment Journey

Dilip grew up in the Dilerjung area, known for the obscurity of the slum area with his parents and older brother. Though not academically inclined, Dilip found solace in the arts, being a shy child.

Dilip was able to pursue an animation course and secure a job with the help of Calcutta Rescue. Despite losing his job during the pandemic, he found work as a texture artist in a media and design company in Hyderabad. Dilip and his family are grateful for the support of Calcutta Rescue.

MENTAL HEALTH

Over the last few years Calcutta Rescue has systemized its mental health care for its students. It began with simple counseling sessions for children who were experiencing difficulties such as trauma, abuse and neglect. While the program continues to do this, it has evolved - and is now addressing issues earlier on in the child's life so they are better prepared for such eventualities. Such issues include child marriage, myths about menstruation, puberty-related issues, cyberbullying and good touch and bad touch.

► Gender Sensitisation in Slums

Calcutta Rescue promotes gender sensitivity and inclusivity among students to cultivate a gender-friendly atmosphere from an early age.

With guidance from CR's Research Collaborative, our mental health counsellor conducted a baseline GEM study (Gender Equitable Measurement) to understand the gender sensitivity of our students in 2021. GEM is a well-known valid & reliable measurement scale to find out respondents' attitudes toward gender. The study was conducted on 282 students from class 5 to 12. **We found that 40% of girls and 34% of boys already consider men and women to be equivalent.** Based on certain responses we understood our students' views on violence against women, gender discrimination & gender-based violence.

To minimize the gender gaps and to promote gender equality CR has taken certain interventions like regular parents' interactions on certain topics like gender roles, stereotypical behaviour, early marriage hazards, the importance of educating a girl child etc, external resource person sensitizing about gender issues to students & parents, gender equality training for education team members where after the training we tried to promote more gender friendly classrooms & more empathetic behaviours from the students, teachers started using gender-neutral languages & working on to avoid stereotyping & gender biases.



Formation of Boys Club

As a part of the gender equality project, we formed an after-school boys club where adolescents' boys meet up regularly & express their issues, challenges of this age & ways to overcome social taboos.

Boys Club offers them a safe space where they can share their views without being judged/criticized. Students whatever learnt during group counselling sessions, discuss with their peer groups in the community as well. As a part of the Boys Club, they are engaged in different activities like poster making on different topics like early marriage, gender inequality, gender-based violence, dowry, eve teasing, the importance of girls' education etc.

The boy advocates - who are proactive boys club members are also working to break the stereotypical thoughts associated with gender. They are speaking in front of their community members on issues like girls' safety & education, gender roles & women's rights.



Life Skill Training

Skills such as time management and problem-solving are vital tools for young people in today's fast-paced and competitive world, but few schools in India teach them.

They are doubly important for children whose parents are not literate and who are growing up in a slum, which is why Calcutta Rescue has begun teaching these life skills, plus others such as critical thinking, collaboration, and leadership.

Starting from June 2022, the training started with 32 girls aged between 12 to 18 for the lessons. In early 2023, the program resumed with 126 girls and 126 boys of the same age and CR's counselling team. Through these life skill lessons, Calcutta Rescue aims to provide its students with the tools they need to succeed in life and become self-sufficient individuals who can make a positive impact on their families and communities.



LIVING STANDARDS

Calcutta Rescue felt the need for Living Standards after conducting a large-scale survey in 2019 on the lines of the Multidimensional Poverty Index (MPI). The survey analysed various aspects of poverty in the slum areas CR works in.

The Living Standards focus on improving access to clean drinking water, proper sanitation, durable concrete lanes and homes in slums, and solid waste management projects. This vertical is also responsible for the implementation of CR's Safe Drinking Water program in 12 villages in Malda.

► Project KIRAN



Surging populations, coupled with the ever-increasing demand for sustenance, have led to the generation of huge quantities of waste leading to landfills throughout the globe. In the slums of developing countries like India, it is a further challenge. Urban slums are generally signified by a high density of low-income earners, and unemployed populations coupled with poor infrastructural facilities and unhygienic conditions.

To address the issue locally, 'Metro Colony' slum in Dakshineswar is one such area where Calcutta Rescue, with CESC's support, is intervening with a small-scale vermicompost plant so the biodegradable waste can be prevented from reaching landfills, reducing carbon footprint and generate a sustainable income for local residents of the slums.

To sustain the project, a Self Help Group (SHG) was formed with proactive womenfolk. Workshops and sessions were done to help them understand the necessity of the solid waste management project in the slum from both hygiene and income generation prospects.

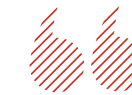


Three dedicated individuals, including two women and one man, lead the compost project, with additional support from women in the Self-Help Group (SHG). This initiative has sparked positive change among the women in the slum community.



Manika Rajbangshi, residing in Dakshineswar slum with her family, actively manages the vermicompost work alongside her husband. In contrast, her son works as a daily labourer.

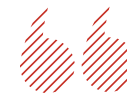
Manika, an active SHG member and co-founder of the compost project, shared her transformative experience with Calcutta Rescue, saying,



We aimed to improve our financial stability for a hassle-free life, and Calcutta Rescue provided us with that opportunity.

Jharna Das, another member of the vermicompost unit, lives with her husband, daughter, and grandson. Her husband's work as a daily labourer was impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Jharna's unwavering commitment to the compost project earned her a spot as a worker through her active participation in SHG discussions. Jharna echoed the same enthusiasm as her colleague stating,



I'm supporting my family with the income from this vermicompost project.



With the guidance and support of Calcutta Rescue, Manika and Jharna have become essential contributors to the Dakshineswar compost project.

Several group members have already taken the initiative to sell compost packets each month, with Jyotsna selling 25 kg through her personal connections and Mangala, a domestic worker, selling 15 kg from her own network. This project has not only improved their community's engagement but also brought people together in their slum community.

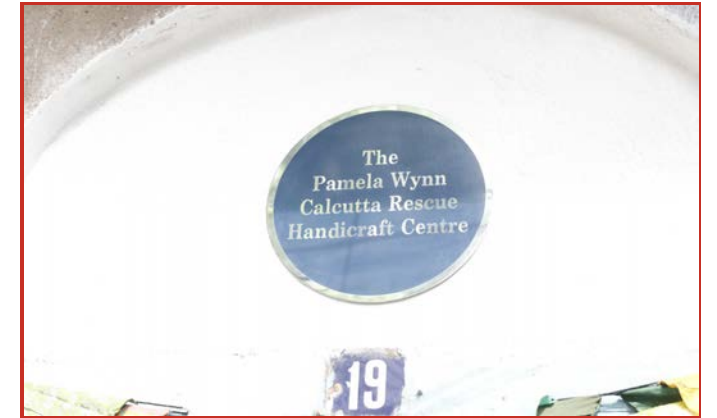
HANDICRAFTS



Calcutta Rescue's Fairtrade handicrafts project has been named after UK volunteer **Pamela Wynn** who set it up 31 years ago to provide work for sick and unemployed people in Kolkata.

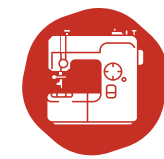
For most of that time, she spent six months to a year in India helping to run the project. Pamela Wynn was the one who raised funds and kept it going. The handicraft centre now sports a blue plaque over the door in her honour - a tradition which originates in the UK where blue plaques are erected on buildings linked to people who make a significant contribution to public life.

The project provides training and employment to Calcutta Rescue's past patients who do not have any other way to earn money, students who dropped out of formal education, and domestic abuse survivors.

► Restoration of Livelihoods Project

The pandemic decimated livelihoods and slashed already abysmally low household incomes. CR decided to use its Handicrafts unit during this time to help resurrect the situation in these struggling households. A 3-month training course was designed on Tailoring and Hand Embroidery for people residing in the slums.

Top-performing students are given sewing machines upon completing the course to start their own business or work.

Shaista, a 28-year-old girl, has been diligently supporting her needy family. Residing in Howrah's slums with her parents and four siblings, she faces numerous challenges. Her father, the sole breadwinner, works as a utensil polisher. One of her brothers is undergoing treatment for drug addiction, incurring considerable expenses. The other siblings are attending school.

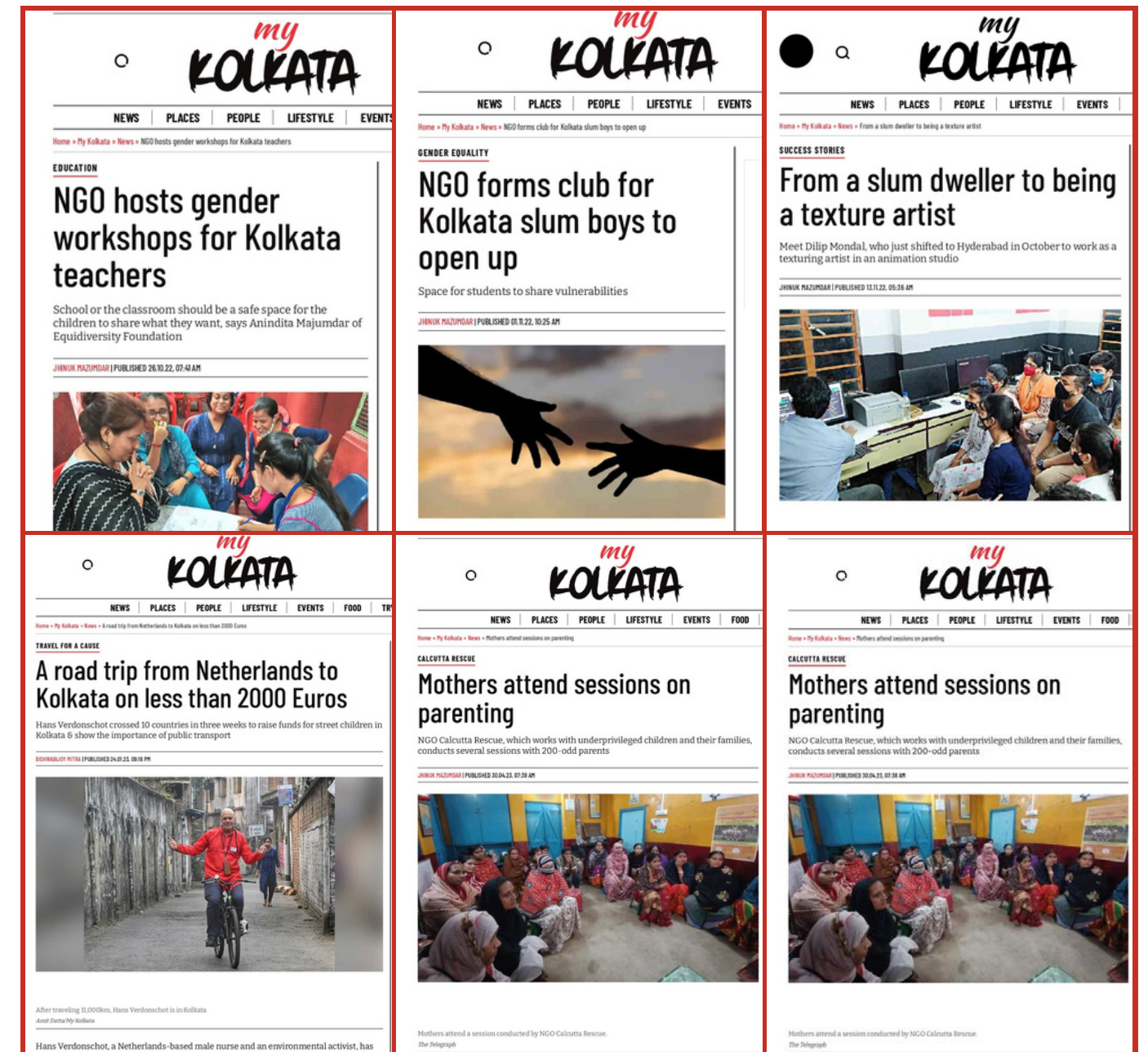
Determined to assist her family, Shaista enrolled in CR's vocational training program's 3rd session. **She excelled in the workshop and is now a skilled tailor, earning a monthly income of approximately Rs. 1200.00.** CR's handicraft project provided her with a sewing machine and selected her for additional training in tailoring and hand embroidery.

Shaista has made remarkable progress in her professional skills and serves as an inspiring example to women in conservative society. We salute change-makers like Shaista who catalyze positive transformations in their lives and societal mindsets.

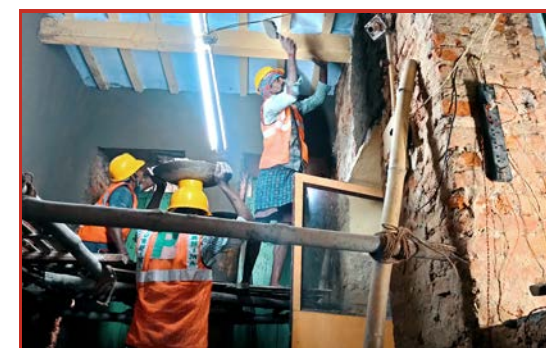
► Staff Recreation

► New Education Project Building Update



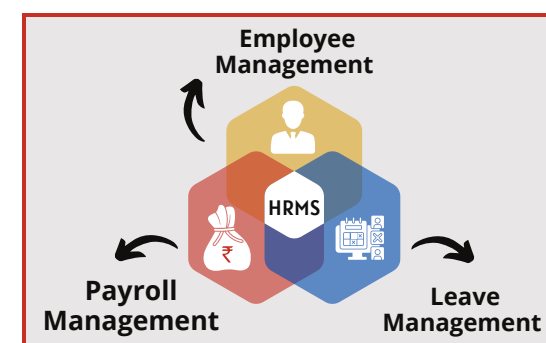
Around 90% of the renovation work at 20 Iswar Mill Lane is completed. We have received the Kolkata Municipal Corporation approval for the construction of two new additional rooms on the 1st and top floors. With everything looking great, we hope that it will be completed in early 2024.

► Beneficiary Management System



Calcutta Rescue introduced Beneficiary Management System (BMS) in September 2022 to record patients' data digitally. For the past 40 years details of all patients and students have been meticulously stored as paper records filling up dozens of old filing cabinets. Now CR has invested in a computer system to store all patient and student records and has managed to purchase laptops and tablets which staff can use to access them.

► Human Resource Management System



GreytHR, one of the leading cloud-based HRMS and payroll software in India, has provided online training to admin personnel. After getting conversant with the process, training sessions will be conducted for other staff. And slowly the whole process of staff management will become digital as well.

RESEARCH

Over the past few years, Calcutta Rescue (CR) has actively expanded its research activity. CR has identified developed an institutional research strategy focuses on three core research areas:

- **research on the multidimensional nature of poverty;**
- **research on nutrition especially in pregnant & lactating women and children; and**
- **research on factors related to the prevention of diseases and the promotion of mental health.**

CR research is currently coordinated by a task force group consisting of former long-term volunteers with a research background and/or specific expertise in a particular field, Jaydeep Chakraborty (CEO) and a member of the local staff. The task of the group is to set up a structure for research in the CR context and to ensure rigorous quality control and accountability in research undertaken by CR.

The knowledge obtained by the 2019 multidimensional poverty (MPI) study has led to targeted interventions addressing the sanitary needs of slum residents in Dakshineswar (by the installment of toilets and washing stations), and the sexual and reproductive health needs of people living in Nimtala (by health education sessions addressing this topic by the outreach team).

The next round of the MPI is scheduled early 2024 and the preparations for this large research project is now in full swing. The 2024 MPI version will be complemented with a few questions about diseases and healthcare use.

Research has also been carried out in the context of the gender equality program. This program, which focusses at the improvement of gender equality in adolescent boys and girls is evaluated annually by means of standardized questionnaires addressing gender attitudes and norms, attitudes towards- and experience with gender-based violence, gender related behavior and well-being.

VOLUNTEERS

The FY22-23 saw the very welcome return of physical volunteers to Kolkata, following the two-year pandemic.

Calcutta Rescue received medical students from Solidar India, a France based organisation and CR's long-term partner. They volunteered in CR's medical projects.

In August 2022, Calcutta Rescue received two long-term volunteers, one doctor and an auditor, from the UK.

While volunteering with Calcutta Rescue, I honed my communication and problem-solving abilities in demanding situations.

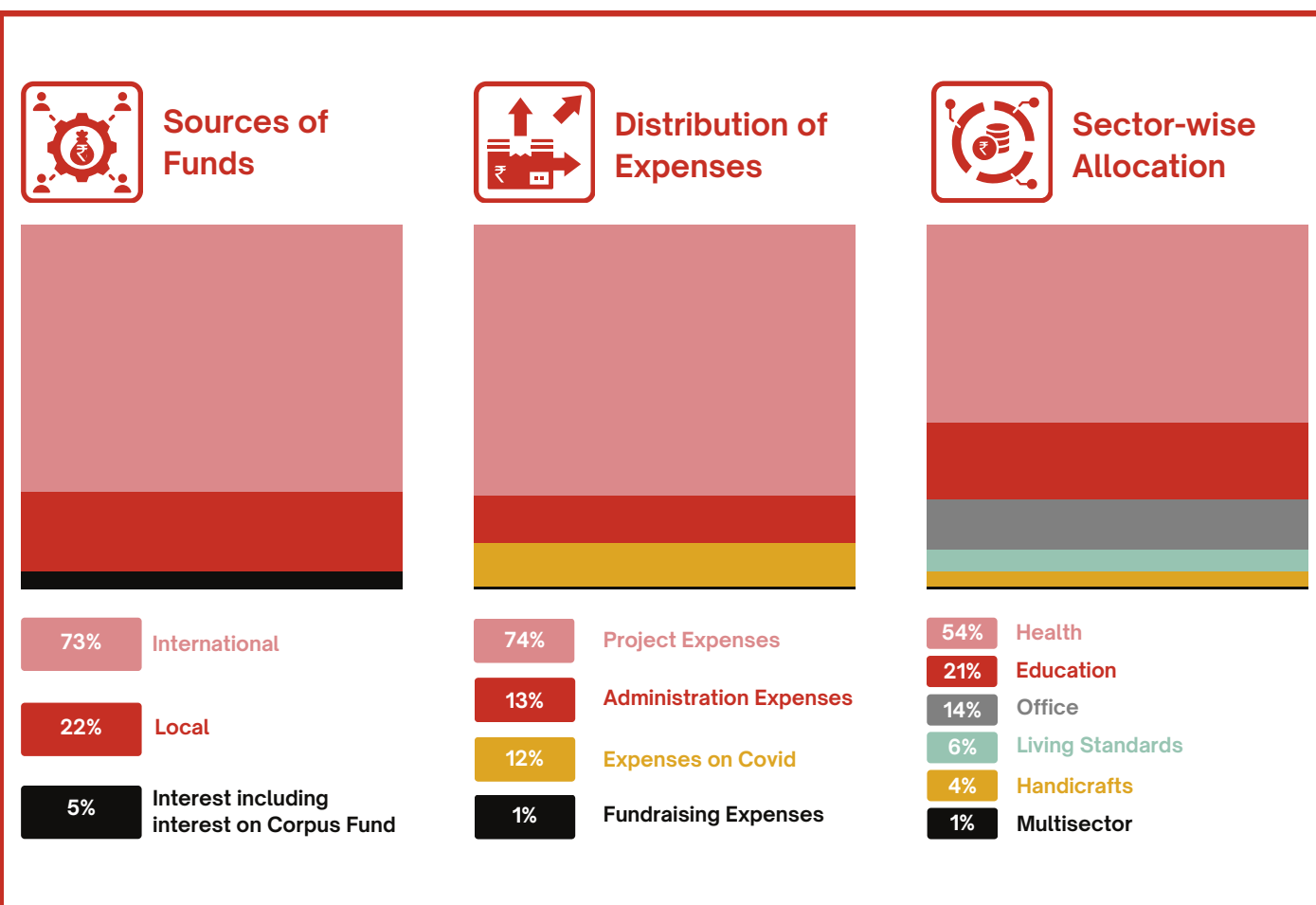
Edward Blake is an auditor by profession who helped CR's finance, IT and HR & Admin departments with updating policies and helped in developing the organisation's risk management manual.
